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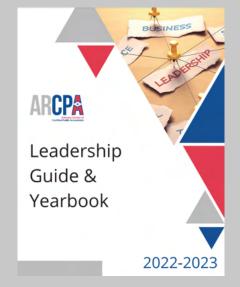

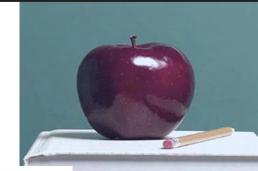
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ACCOUNTING EDUCATORS CONFERENCE WRAP-UP

AICPA Spring Council Wrap-Up

In May, we traveled to Austin, Texas, to attend the first inperson AICPA Council Meeting in a few years. We were last together in 2019 in Seattle for the AICPA Fall Meeting of Council. It was great to see fellow colleagues from around the country! The Council meetings are always interesting and informative. We come away with a fresh perspective on the profession and what the AICPA is doing to handle the constant changes we face.

The Arkansas Society was represented by Gina Moran, Chair of the ARCPA Board of Directors; Joseph Rugger, Past Chair of the Board; Randy Milligan, Incoming AICPA Council Representative; Beth Smith, Outgoing AICPA Council Representative; and Marsha Moffitt, ARCPA Executive Director/CEO.

There were three major takeaways from the meeting:

- The ESG movement (Environmental, Social and Governance) has moved to the forefront of the market;
- DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) continues to grow; and
- The pipeline for our profession.

In the area of ESG, the AICPA is advocating for global standards, positioning the profession's role in controls, measurement, internal decision making, external reporting, and assurance. While doing that, the AICPA will support businesses and firms of all sizes with implementation of these items. They will also provide tools, learning, and thought leadership to accomplish the stated goals of ESG.

We still have a long way to go in the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion space. Diversity is more visible with every meeting we attend, but only 14 percent of our profession is represented by minorities. The onus is on us to make intentional decisions and take actions that make

our workplaces more representative of the clients and communities we serve.

Almost every discussion between CPAs at the Council meeting involved some sort of exchange about the pipeline and the effect it is having on the profession. There are several major items that are impacting the pipeline:

- A decline in the undergraduate population;
- A decrease in accounting graduates which leads to fewer CPA exam candidates: and
- Firms are hiring fewer accounting graduates and more non-accounting graduates.

We have a lot of opportunities to improve these areas. Begin talking to students before they reach college and present them with the various paths a CPA can take in their career, away from the standard audit or tax positions. Provide meaningful internship programs in cooperation with universities that will help eliminate some of the obstacles in obtaining the CPA license. Promote the accounting profession as part of the STEM curriculum. To a great extent, the ability to solve some of the pipeline issues is on us.

"Inspiration through Uncertainty" is how we can view the last couple of years and how we can move forward through the next several years. The CPA profession continues to retain the trusted advisor status. We must do everything we can to maintain that status. The reality of the changing world requires us to continue raising the bar on innovation, standards, trust, and integrity amid disruption.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as the AICPA Council Representative for the ARCPA for the last three years. It has truly been my honor and pleasure to serve in this capacity.

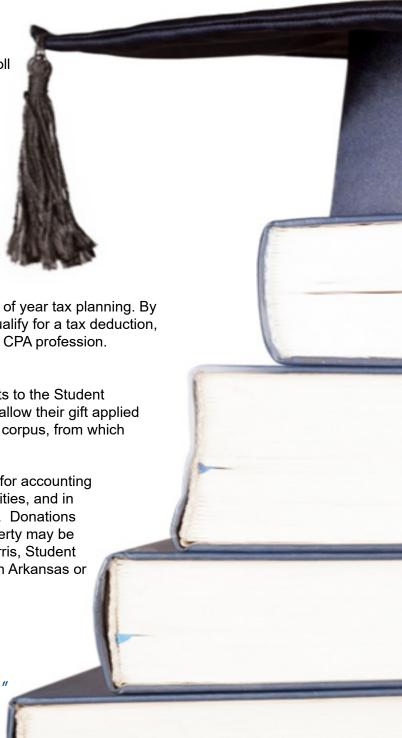
About the Student Education Fund

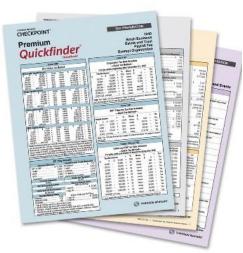

The past few years have propelled workplace culture into ever-changing territory. But even before the pandemic, generational attitudes and emerging technologies were creating pressing conversations around how workplaces function.

"Right now we are feeling a heightened sense of 'us versus them' between organizations' employees and senior leadership when it comes to things like working remotely or working in the office," said Samantha Julka, president and founder of DORIS Research, a workplace research firm based in Indianapolis.

Firms that aren't taking note of these tensions and considering cultural shifts to their organizations are at risk of falling behind—especially when it comes to competing for a currently shrinking talent pool of future CPA professionals. Are you prepared to move toward meeting their expectations?

The New Office Space

There's no way around it: the pandemic has created an awakening around whether the traditional office still has merit.

"The next five years will provide us with ample time to really dig in and prototype what the workplace of the future could be," Julka said.

In general, employees are no longer seeing the physical space as the place where work happens, but instead a place for connection. Sure, it's important to assess whether or not your team has access to the tech and supplies they need when working in house. But it's also important to examine if your space is supporting a positive and productive culture. The more the space is conducive to creating connections and giving team members opportunity to collaborate and engage with each other—both professionally and personally—the more likely your team is

going to want to find themselves in the office.

But there's no one-size-fits-all solution for all. "The organizations that succeed will do so by truly listening to the needs of all stakeholders involved," Julka said. "Those that can show empathy and grace for both the needs of the organization and the needs of the people who make up the organization will achieve far greater success than their counterparts that want to battle over mandates."

The New Dress Code

Dress codes have been loosening gradually through the years, even in traditionally buttoned-up industries. But Zoom calls and Team communications over traditional face-to-face have loosened expectations even more. What does this mean for the new era of working in the office?

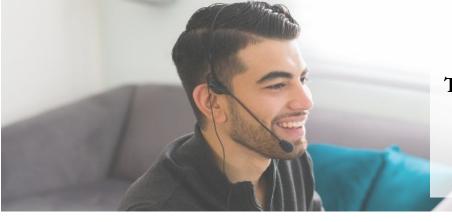
According to the Journal of Accountancy, HR professionals in firms across the country are getting more creative with approaches to dress codes. One of the most popular tactics is the "dress for your day" policy, giving flexibility to wear more casual attire—within reason—when employees aren't handling client-facing tasks for the day, and more appropriate dress on days when meeting with clients. Most keep a back-up ensemble on-hand at the office for surprise meetings.

It's also important to remember client dress codes are changing, as well. Reflecting their dress code in meetings is becoming increasingly acceptable and, for some clients, preferred.

The New Work Schedule

When people have had a taste of flexibility, they're not going to want to head back into the box.

"Over 80% of employees want a hybrid schedule and the sweet spot for coming into the office is merely one to two days a week," said Lindsay Boccardo.

A desire for work schedule flexibility isn't new. The pandemic just pushed us to jump into a "group experiment" where we questioned our productivity without the office and, for many, the standard 9–5 schedule.

"We've known for a decade that millennials wanted flexibility in work life and location. Now the next generation in the workforce, Gen Z, can't imagine a world without it," Boccardo said.

Gen Z will continue to demand this flexibility, and the generations behind them are likely to expect it.

"They grew up with a desk's worth of work tools in their backpacks," Boccardo explained. They want to work not only where they want—"What does a desk really offer when my laptop can sit with me in my van by the beach?" Boccardo mused—but also when they want.

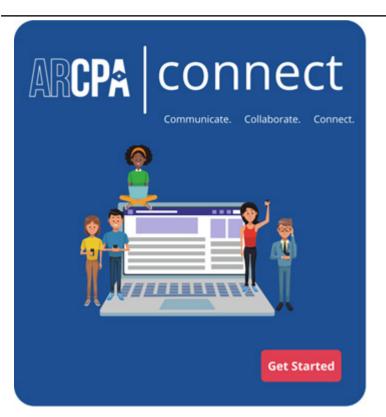
Schedule flexibility is a driving force of employee engagement, a crucial area for helping to address talent

pipeline concerns. According to a recent Inc. article: "Engaged employees are both more productive and more likely to stay with you for the long term. So giving the people who work for you the flexibility to be good spouses, good parents, good partners, and good friends—as well as good employees—will benefit both you and them."

While Gen Z and millennials, who are now approaching middle age and more likely to be juggling parenting responsibilities, are quick to embrace this flexibility, it might bring up mixed emotions for others.

"This can be uncomfortable for those of us who worked from an office for decades believing this was the only way. It can also be frustrating," Boccardo said, especially when coming to the realization working from home could have been happening for years prior to the pandemic.

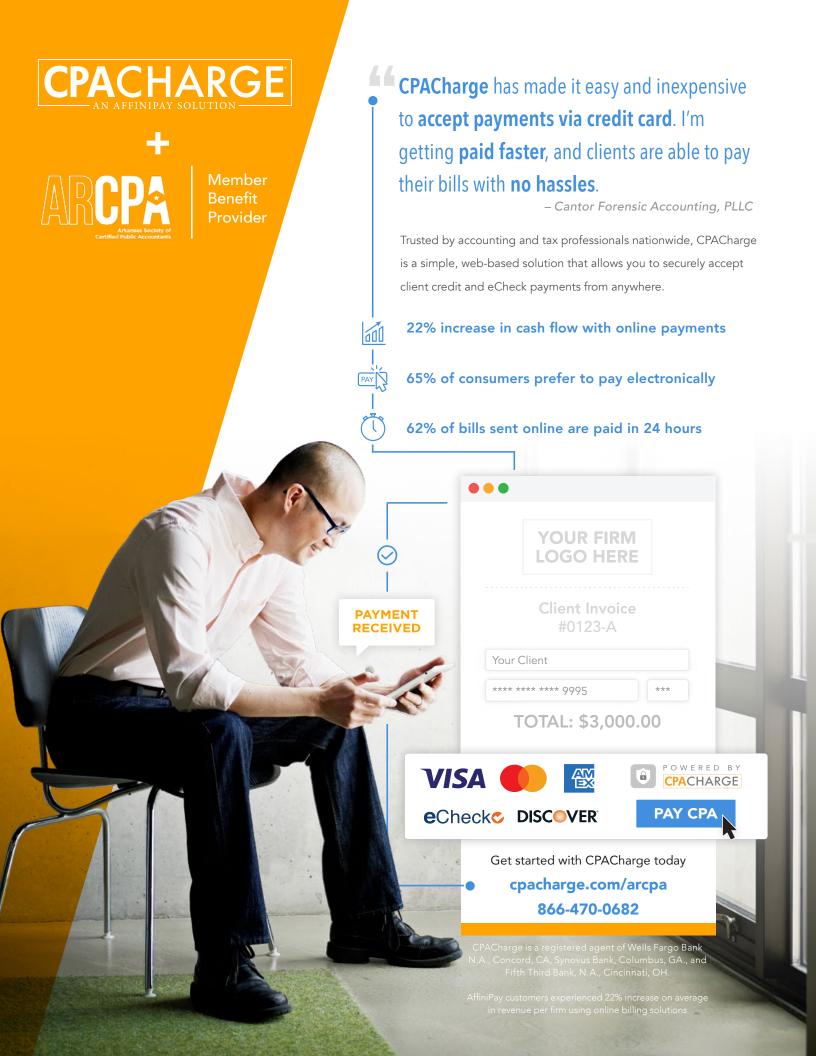
The important thing to remember? "Technology has exponentially changed and there is a new way to work that's available to all of us." Boccardo said.

Firms are using the new .CPA domain to supercharge their online presence. Here's how.

Put a good idea in the hands of CPAs, and they'll find innovative ways to make it even better. That's exactly what's happening right now with the new .cpa web domain.

When .cpa was launched in fall of 2020, there were plenty of good reasons for firms to take notice. For starters, it's a practical way to enhance client trust – when clients see a firm with a .cpa domain they know it's a firm they can trust rather than some questionable fly-by-night operation. That's because only individually-licensed CPAs and licensed CPA firms can obtain a .cpa domain through a verification process managed by CPA.com, a subsidiary of the AICPA. There's also the issue of security: When firms adopt the .cpa domain, they're better able to protect firm and client data from phishing and other security threats, since top-level domains like .cpa are more resistant to fraud than the less-regulated, more commonly used .com.

And then there are the brand benefits. When it comes to using the .cpa domain to support their brand and marketing strategies, firms have been steadily innovating, creating new opportunities and advantages that weren't immediately obvious. As a result, in only a short time the profession has seen a host of new domain strategies take flight – and they're just getting started.

If you're wondering whether your firm should make the move to a .cpa domain, here are some domain-based brand strategies (in addition to the benefits of heightened security and trust) that your peers in the profession are already putting to work.

"Let's use this as an opportunity to rebrand"

Rebranding is perhaps the most obvious opportunity presented by the .cpa domain. If your firm feels tethered to a name or web address that it had outgrown, but couldn't find a better option in the overcrowded realm of .com domains, the .cpa domain allows the firm to start fresh. Stuck with JonesCPA.com even though Jones retired five years ago? This is a rare chance to get the website address that fits the firm's present and future ambitions.

"We need a shorter domain!"

As the internet matured, all the good domains were quickly snatched up. If you wanted to own the JonesCPA.com address, it was probably already held by some other Jones CPA, or by a squatter who bought it in the hopes of selling

it at a higher price. This led to some very long domains that are virtually impossible for clients to remember. The .cpa domain offers the opportunity for firms to secure shorter, more memorable domains – a simple and effective boost to your brand and marketing efforts. That's why Texas-based DWG CPA jumped at the opportunity to secure the dwg.cpa url, which is easy for clients and prospects to remember and supports the firm's branding efforts.

"Over ten years ago, we secured dwgcpatx.com for our newly launched firm," said Managing Director Darrell Groves, CPA, CGMA. "But as our firm grew and matured over the years, it became clear that our domain name was just too long and hard to remember. When we thought about the value of marketing our firm, and of having a shorter url, it didn't take us long to decide we needed to make the move to a .cpa domain," he said.

"Let's target specific markets with our domain"

Specialization continues to grow in importance as a tool for firms to distinguish themselves from the competition and tap into a deep well of clients. For example, some firms focus on serving the restaurant industry, or manufacturers. Others specialize in certain types of services – taxes, SOC audits, or client accounting services (CAS), to name only a few. Some focus on segments such as startups. Some firms distinguish by geography and are looking to market themselves within specific towns, regions, or states. Many firms have already started to adopt domain names that reflect their specific niche, making it easier for clients to find them in online searches and reinforcing their commitment to specific markets. Acosta Tax & Advisory's MiamiBeach.cpa is one example of this hyper-targeted strategy in action, helping the firm appear prominently in the online search results of prospective clients looking for a CPA in the area. Another is SOCAudit.cpa. Guess what they specialize in?

Firms can even heighten the impact of these urls through a multiple domain strategy. By leveraging website redirects, they can advertise market-specific or geotargeted url's that stand out from the competition and then redirect web browsers to a primary website. This enables firms to have a primary website, such as Cromer.cpa, but to advertise catchy, branded domains such as TaxGuru.cpa or BayArea. cpa, while not having to manage multiple websites.



Firms are using the new .CPA Action Items From The AFOT Survey

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The Accounting Firm and Operation Technology (AFOT) survey has measured the use of technology by accounting firms for almost a decade. The most benefit comes from taking the survey and receiving the results at no charge. There are clear action items from the AFOT survey for this year. In fact, we started the survey to learn what was essential to decision-makers in accounting firms and what projects were likely to be of utmost importance in the coming year. Like the prior years, this year's AFOT survey helps show the way.

The Most Important Action Items

Over the last decade, information technology has significantly impacted the job market and client service levels. Subsequently, technology invents new jobs, redefines old ones, or replaces them. As a result, technology sparked the digital transformation of businesses. As a result, technology touches practically every area of your firm and for your clients.

This AFOT is the eighth annual survey with sixty questions. We have longitudinal data with many of these questions included each year since the survey started. The results are statistically valid. While surveys have suffered some reputational damage for accuracy in the immediate past, our respondents typically help us see their future decisions based on the feedback.

The following areas are ones that firms expect action on soon:

1.Get a Trusted Consultant or Peer for Difficult Decisions

Making software decisions and security & risk management were leading issues. 19% cite security as the most significant technology issue faced. Further, outsourcing of labor from providers like Xpitax surfaced in our results. Joining an association like the Woodard Institute, CPAConnect, or a comparable group reduces risk.

2.Training is needed to maintain a competitive IT edge Cloud technologies do not seem to be reducing complexity. Implementing technology requires more knowledge than ever before. While hosting providers have eased the complexity of maintaining legacy desktop applications like QuickBooks desktop and third-party add-ons, much focus is on SaaS offerings. Microsoft 365, QuickBooks Online, digital plumbing tools such as Zapier, and choosing the right technology stack has become a significant factor.

Sending leaders and technicians alike for training is seen as a competitive advantage for IT knowledge. 89% of practitioners do webinars as a CPE activity during the year.

3. Spend what is needed on IT

We were surprised to see the continued shift from developing an IT budget to spending what is needed on IT. 88% of respondents no longer have an IT budget, while 83% use two or more monitors. 74% use a secure portal to transfer or share files with clients. 47% now use hosted email by Microsoft 365 or Google Apps outside of the office. There are indications this trend is accelerating rapidly.

4. Workflow, work location, and qualified staff are top concerns

49% of our respondents faced communication and workflow challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic. 53% of our respondents spend 90% of their time working from the office. 32% cite recruiting as their top challenge in managing their firm. Recruiting seemed to be more of an issue for growing firms, and staff turnover is becoming an issue for many.

5. Zoom became a boom, and Teams closed the gap Awareness of remote meeting tools went from 45.5% up to 81.8%. Zoom's market share went to 51.4%, with Teams going from around 0 to 13.9%. GoToMeeting usage dropped for the third straight year.

Conclusion: Which Tech Right for You?

Above, we have listed the five AFOT survey results that will need your attention. Note that obtaining outside expertise and training are critical to success. Further, software selection, including the proper tool stack, cybersecurity, workflow, and portals, is essential. Hosting and SaaS have become dominant delivery vehicles to support communication. Finally, staffing and recruitment are often solved by outsourcing labor.

In short, if you want to work in the constantly evolving accounting field, you will need to maintain and improve your skills. While accounting is full of discoveries and opportunities, where you will never be bored and have a chance to make a difference, supporting our jobs with the tech field is needed, too. Above all, you will be right in the middle of growth and disruption, thanks to technology.
